Rabbi / Jeffrey:

As friends and family, we gather to celebrate the arrival of this new member of humanity, to share in the joy of loving parents and to participate with them as they prepare to bring their new son into the covenant of our people.

Our tradition teaches that all members of all generations entered into a unique relationship with God and one another at Sinai. This relationship, known as the brit or the Covenant, joins God and the Jewish people in the task of improving the world. Today, their son becomes a partner in that Covenant.

Caleb Mayr passes over a threshold and we mark his passage from his mother's womb into his father's waiting hands and into the welcoming arms of the community of Israel, K'lal Yisrael.

CRAFTING THE NAMES

Hana and Greg:

Caleb, your presence in our lives means so much to us. It feels only fitting that the names we give you be embedded with meaning as well.

CALEB

Your first name is derived from the Hebrew words, **kol**, meaning whole, and **lev**, for heart. We love the idea of welcoming a wholehearted child into our lives and watching you grow and explore the world around you.

To us, being wholehearted means embracing new experiences, living life thoughtfully, developing a strong sense of self, and showing compassion to all people, creatures, and the planet. We hope that your wholeheartedness also applies to the important relationships in your life: your extended family scattered across the country and the world (who are so excited to meet you); the friendships you make; the community you build.

Wherever your inspiration and curiosity take you, we hope that you follow them wholeheartedly, and know that we wholeheartedly support and love you every step of the way.

Caleb also has roots in the Hebrew word, **kelev**, meaning dog. In our experience, a dog also approaches life wholeheartedly. We hope that one day you know the love of a dog who teaches you the value of living in the moment, tuning into the rhythms of the natural world, a loving devotion to your pack, and that sometimes a little playfulness is exactly what you need.

Your great grandpa **Bob Mercer** was a veterinarian who cared for many dogs (and other animals) throughout his long career. He also worked very hard to provide for his family, bringing us opportunities that would enhance and enrich our lives. We hope that your first name also evokes a connection to Grandpa Bob and the gifts that he and Grandma Shirley gave us, which ultimately helped pave the way for you.

MAYR

We're happy to honor **Maxine Rothenberg**, your dad's Grandma Max. Family was always at the center of her life, and she and Grandpa AJ loved gathering everyone together. Laughter is some of the best medicine, and Grandma Max always made sure there was plenty of it around. She also loved the arts and even embraced the challenge of picking up oil painting later in life. (One of her paintings lovingly adorns your room.) It's our hope that Maxine's spirited love for life and family finds its way through our family and touches you.

In Hebrew, Mayr means "one who shines". This plays off your mom's last name, **Schein**. Though the spelling may be different, we hope that you always feel connected to the Schein/ Bernstein side of your family. They're a spirited clan who've never been afraid to put their own spin on something.

Caleb Mayr, we cannot wait to see the light you shine upon the world.

SCHEIN FAMILY TRADITIONS

Deborah and Jeffrey:

When each of our children (Ben, Jonah and Hana) was born we selected a Hebrew song which matched the first letter of their names. Each child's song was sung at the Schein Shabbat dinner table as the child's birthday approached.

At Hana's naming, her song was created as a Hebrew acrostic that matched a biblical or liturgical verse with each letter of her Hebrew name. For Caleb, we are focusing on his middle name Mayr which symbolizes light. These songs were chosen to reflect the hopes and dreams we have for you.

Or Zarua:

אוֹר זֶרִעַ לַצַּדִּיק, וּלְיִשְׁרֵי-לֵב שִׂמְחָה.

Or zaruah latzadik, u'li-yish-rei lev simcha.

Translation: Light is sown for the righteous, and gladness for the sincere at heart.

Or Hadash (Shine a New Light):

אוֹר חָדָשׁ עַל צִיוֹן תָּאִיר וְנְזְכֶּה כֵלְנוּ בִּמְהֵרָה

Or hadash al tzyon ta-ir, venizkeh khulanu meherah le-oro.

Translation: Shine a new light upon Zion May we all soon be privileged to enjoy and spread that light!

Once he receives this identity of being known as Caleb Mayr, the son of Hana and Kasriel in the household of Israel we move on to the circumcision.
